The Training Division would like to thank Battalion Chief Chris Gould for teaching all of the crews compressed natural gas (CNG) vehicle fire response. There are beer delivery trucks on the street now, and a new fill station in the District at Waste Management (WM). It is reported that WM will have up to 70 new CNG vehicles. These vehicles require a very unique tactic when firefighting. When dealing with most pressurized tanks with flammable gas, water is general applied to the tank to prevent rupture. The CNG tanks are the opposite, if water is applied directly to the tanks, they can rupture causing an explosion. Next, the Training Division would like to thank Lieutenant Derek Foss for teaching all crews the National Grid System. This is a process of map reading to determine how to find a given location when there is no cellular or GPS unit/or service available, and when there are no street signs, which was the case when Hurricane Andrew tore through South Florida. Crews also completed an EMT module for EMT recertification, and 4 fire modules towards ISO requirements on Target. The week of June 19th was this year's Annual Firefighter Health & Safety Week. Crews participated by reviewing material on NIOSH's website and reviewing a line of duty death (LODD) investigation, that the Safety Committee produced as an assignment. The week is for focusing on what is getting Firefighters killed around the country, with the hope of preventing future injuries or LODD's.
